## **Grafham Gen** Sam Malt

A brief history of Ellington's Water Supply

Water mains were laid from Hinchingbrooke water tower in Huntingdon to supply Ellington, Brampton, Easton and Spaldwick. This work was carreid out in 1947 with a booster station and water tower at Ellington. Water pressure improved later to these villages when the Bromholme Lane station came on line.

Before mains water, Ellington's supply consisted of three good public wells and private wells. Ellington Thorpe had to wait until the mid fifties.

## Buckden Surgery Patients Association (BSPA)

A precis of an article by Sue Paul BSPA

It has been a fairly quiet month for matters concerning the Primary Care Trust (PCT), but next month I expect to elaborate on some developing trends resulting from funding cutbacks that are being caused by the huge debt we inherited when we were forced to merge the PCTs - debts that we in this area had no responsibility for at all. The impact on our services is both significant and of some increasing concern.

The results of the GP Patient Survey conducted throughout England earlier this year have now been officially published. Those who might wish to delve into more detail can go to the website at

The results for Cambridgeshire are above the national average for patient satisfaction, but I'm pleased to report that our surgery is between 4 - 17 % above the Cambridgeshire average, an indication of how fortunate we are!

We welcome Jayne Wiles who is being trained as a phlebotomist, she will be job-sharing with Wendy once her training has been completed.

the surgery in early September to enable you to book a suitable time.

The touchscreen booking-in system is working well and I'm delighted to report

that anecdotally, women are having fewer problems than the men, who apparently take longer to read the instructions and then follow them carefully.

Work will begin on the refurbishment of the surgery in September, when inevitably, there will be some disruption. The staff will do all they can to minimise any problems and it will hopefully, all be very worthwhile when it is finished.

## Grafham Cricket Club In normal seasons, (where rainy days can be counted

on the fingers of one hand); issues at this time of the season would be about promotion, relegation, mid table safety, but not this year! The issue is rain, how much before the weekend, during the weekend, is the surface safe to play on? What other fixtures are being cancelled? If the entire league's fixtures are consistently postponed, all teams earn the same points. Some games have been played so this is not the case; Grafham is

in the bottom spot, but in close contact with the team above. Since the last issue of the "Gossip", Grafham have fully played three of their allotted matches, with a fourth abandoned when the rain became persistently too heavy to continue.

Grafham enjoyed its first and only victory to date against the Aryan Afghans. The match was played at Mowsbury Park on

July 14th. Grafham won the toss, and elected to bat. The outstanding features of the Grafham innings was Ian Dickson's dogged 24 not out; some wayward bowling, and poor wicket keeping, which allowed Grafham to progress to an all out total of 130. In the last game against the Aryan Afghans Grafham let their advantage slip, when aggressive batting, punished short of a length bowling, leavened with some dubious umpiring decisions. Consistent and accurate bowling by John Fozzard and Adi Love pinned down any aggressive intent, and regularly took wickets; John taking 5, and Adi 2 respectively. Ben Dickson opened his bowling account by taking a wicket with his first ball, and finished with 3. Celebrations with fruit juice were duly carried out at the "Chequers", on the way home.

The next match was Lidlington at home, who had comprehensively beaten Grafham a few weeks earlier. Grafham opened the batting and soon were 42 for 6, but a spirited 14 by Katherine Budd, and a "they shall not pass" attitude by the remaining tail pushed Grafham's score to a 108 for 9 at the end of the allotted 40 overs. The first 20 overs of Lidlington's innings bowled by John Fozzard and Adi Love yielded 25 runs for 3 wickets, with 7 maidens, but although a further 4 wickets were taken by Ben Dickson and Gareth Harris, Lidlington squeezed to victory with just 2 balls remaining. The next week was to be the "Single Wicket Competition", but "Down came the Rain".

The following week was an away game against league leaders Putnoe. Putnoe this year have changed their home ground away from Mowsbury Park to a ground share with Bromham Nomads. The Bromham ground is the epitome of a village cricket ground. The ground is located on a hill, surrounded on three sides by mature trees including beech, with a view across a valley of arable and pasture, criss-crossed by low hedgerows, punctuated by small copses of ash and sycamore melting towards a blue horizon. Bells ringing in a nearby church: a wedding had just taken place; a be-ribboned white Rolls was making a slow passage along a cart track by the cricket field; the sun was hot, a peerless day for any summer.

Grafham won the toss, and batted first, and soon were in trouble against swing bowling, finishing all out for 53. During this innings John Fozzard badly pulled a calf muscle, and retired hurt. As John is our leading strike bowler this diminished our bowling attack. Putnoe as league leaders had ar expectation of winning without loss. This expectation was rapidly undermined with Ben Dickson and Tom Clayton taking 5 Putnoe wickets before Grafham's total was passed. Grafham left after tea, with Putnoe's captain expressing his incredulity at Putnoe's batting performance.

The next game was against Mowsbury Park at Home. Rain was forecast for the evening. Mowsbury batted first scoring 148 for 5 before the rains came early. Conditions caused by the strong southerly wind created difficulties for the bowlers from the Ellington end. Commendably Adam Dighton finished with 2 wickets for 34 off 9 overs with 3 maidens, with Adi Love completing his 9 over spell with 1 wicket for 22 with 1 maiden. Two exceptional catches were taken by Grafham; a one handed catch by Colin Grundy at mid-off, and painful head high catch at square by Adi Love.
