



The Ellington Thorpe Horse Races

The course was about two miles around the farm using the hedges as jumps and the brook as the water jump. Most of the horses arrived by train at Grafham Station on the race day. Grafham Cricket Club

Our opponents on September 1st; were Roxton II. This was their last game of the season, and they wanted to end in a flourish. Our away game earlier in the season had been cancelled due to the poor state of their rain affected pitch. Roxton had also (on their website) expressed disappointment with Grafham for not wanting to play on this pitch. For members of the Grafham team these comments added an extra spur to the match.

Grafham won the toss, and put Roxton into bat on a slightly green wicket, that quickly showed unpredictable bounce. Adam Dighton and Ben Dickson opened Grafham's bowling, and proved a testing and accurate combo, with only 51 runs coming from their 20 overs. Adam worked up pace that troubled all batsman and finished with 3 wickets for 15, while Ben bowled tidily for no reward, going for 31 off his ten overs. Roxton quickly lost more wickets to the change bowlers Adi Love and John Fozzard; slipping to 66 for 9. It was especially pleasing to see John back at the bowling crease fully recovered from the pulled calf muscle he sustained at the Putnoe match, which could have ruled him out for the rest of the season. But Roxton's final two batsmen held the line, putting on 65 runs before their 40 overs expired, giving Roxton a total of 131 for 9. A.P. Singh who scored 48 not out, in his youth was an Indian under 17 batsman: and it showed.

Grafham's reply started badly with Colin Grundy out second ball of the innings, but a patient partnership between Duncan Palmer and Ian Dickson re-built the innings. Roxton's tactic of rotating their bowling made it difficult for lan and Duncan, keeping the Grafham run rate just below what was required. Quick singles became the order of the day, which generated mistakes in Roxton's fielding and improved the run rate. After Duncan was out for 24, lan's innings became pivotal, and looked as though he would steer us home to victory, but he was bowled on the fourth last ball of the innings for 47, leaving two runs for victory off the last three balls. Tense: the heart beats of the Grafham team members in the pavilion would have drowned out any Samba band. Ben Dickson was the next man in, with conflicting advice ringing in his ears about how to approach the coming three balls. Ben slugged the first ball for two, tension

Accurate bowling by Adam Dighton and Adi Love restricted St Andrew's scoring, but again it was one batsman who held out; scoring 65 not out leaving St Andrews at their innings close 148 for 9.

The prospect is that Grafham will be relegated from Division 2, but the spirit and commitment the team showed in the last two games, augur well for the next season, whatever league Grafham

At 7pm on Wed. 10th October we have an evening of presentations For orginal article see www.bandlp.co.t which we believe will both inform and enhance awareness of the available support for many people anxious to maintain their independence at home with dignity and confidence. We also hope it will be of interest to younger people who may need to respond to the growing needs of an ageing relative. There will be presentations by

1. A 'Falls Prevention' coordinator 2. A 'Hospice at Home' speaker 3. A speaker on 'Assisted Technology at Home' with a demonstration of some aids 4. A speaker on Acupuncture. We hope for a really positive response as this is a one-off chance to learn from the professionals in this field. Refreshments will be served and there will be time to answer questions. If you wish to attend, but are unable to get there please contact Betty Millard 810087 or Sue Paul 811650 at least 48 hours inadvance and we shall try to organize a lift. The next important date is Saturday 13th October, and if you have not already booked to have a flu injection this year, appointment sheets for choosing a time between 8am and 2pm are available at Buckden Surgery while for Little Paxton the times are between 9am and 12 mid-day.

Our last important date for this month is **Tuesday 16th October at 7pm** when the BSPA holds its AGM at the Buckden Surgery. We are elected to represent all the patients in this joint practice, so please come along and let us know your views and any issues that concern you.

Concerns about the financial viability of the NHS at local level continue. It is anticipated that the number of beds at Hinchingbrooke Hospital will drop from 240 to 180 which represents a 25% reduction and means closing a further 2 wards. This can only be achieved through shorter hospital stays or having fewer patients referred to hospital in the first instance. Logically this means a significantly increased level of work for our doctors and nurses at the surgery as they cope with the responsibility for patients discharged early after major surgery, and those who might otherwise have been admitted. This is of course in addition to their daily patient commitments. There is a lack of clarity around the funding allocation for this significantly increased workload and the consequent need for more professionals to work with highly dependent patients in the community. Additionally, although there is to be an increase in the budget from next year, Children's Services and Social Care costs will then have to come out of the same Primary Care budget. Effectively this means that at a time of hugely increased expectations on surgeries, the money allocated to Primary Care has to be shared by more people with competing demands. On a lighter note, my paragraph on the touchscreen capabilities of ladies versus men read somewhat

ambiguously! In fact women have fewer problems than men because they take time to read the Instructions and then follow them. Sorry chaps!

Refurbishment of the Buckden surgery is now in progress and it is hoped to keep disruption to the minimum, as I said last month, hopefully the end result will justify any small inconveniences.

Letters to the Editors... Does it not beggar belief that all the people who wanted the speed bumps

removed can now drive as fast as they like. I lived on the Oxmoor estate for many years and thought that speeding drivers there were the worst I would see, that was until I moved to Grafham! There is a national speed limit applies sign at the top of the Brampton Rd, I am quite sure that many of the drivers that use this road have never read the highway code or they would know that a single lane road in this country has a national speed limit of 30 mph. 
