




Sid Bolton lived in Breach Road, Grafham for some fifteen years and was a well-loved character of the village. He died in 2002.

This article first appeared in *The London and UK Events Datebook magazine*, a publication dedicated to the events industry with particular emphasis on the charity sector.

Charity begins... next door?

It was one evening towards the end of August when he came across ... not just down but thoroughly fed up. And it wasn't like him. At all!

For some ten years I had been going in to see Sid, and I had never - ever - seen him downhearted. Even after the lovely Olive departed, of course he was desperately saddened, but there was also almost a sense of relief. His wife had had a painful time towards the end and both were prepared for and at peace with the inevitable. Self-pity wasn't in Sid's makeup at any time during those years after Olive's death. He had Benny the dog, shredded wheat with blackcurrant jam, my books, sport on the telly, the paper, his pipe and more Teachers than a sizeable comprehensive. At lunchtime he was revered in the pub and evening after evening we would jaw and jaw in his front room. He was in the Royal during the war and, apart from the odd bit of green-grocering, a publican from then on. Our interests were parallel and my library was his library military history, travel, biographies, food, booze, sport, natural history, the rural life.

He was a great storyteller and he didn't have to make them up. Many, of course, were from the war. His favourite ship was HMS Penelope, the Pepperpot, due to the 2000 or so shell and shrapnel holes she took in the Anzio landings. He never forgot his luck in going topside for a pee just a few minutes before she got torpedoed. I believe it was some 750 out of 900 who didn't make it. The padre, when told to abandon ship, said 'there are those who need me more down there' and went below to both the wounded and his death. But most of the stories were about the trade, the old-fashioned pub trade of rural Essex during the 1950's to 80's. Poachers, policemen, gamekeepers, marriage guidance, Lord Astor, Irish navvies, the works. I just wish that I had recorded them. What a treat - the Tales of an Essex Publican. This was a time when publicans wore ties and greeted every punter with a cheery hello; departees were hailed with a 'thank you' and 'safe journey'.

Sid was a rotund, bearded fellow with a cheeky smile, an impish sense of humour and the sort of approach to life and interest in others that enamoured him to all. The kids in the village loved him as a sort of adopted, honorary grandfather. They grew up with him. Years later in the pub those same youngsters would joke, chat and play pool with him. He taught them how to lose graciously.

So it went on. We would take around shepherd's pie, homemade burgers, spag bol and such like - no formal arrangement, just as and when.

PARISH NEWS... Following the public meeting on 27th January to discuss issues surrounding the proposed all-weather sports facility, the Parish Council published full details of the project on the village website. These details can also be found on page 5 in this issue of the *Graham Gossip*.

Further to this, and as a result of letters of complaint from one resident to Huntingdon District Council, Biffa Waste Services (the funds provider) and Rural East, the floodlighting has been reviewed. HDC are insisting on the use of a more expensive system and this means that the project will only be able to afford four lights and not the six planned. The only difference in the systems is the price and the fact that HDC already uses this type of lighting.

The Parish Council had planned to bank excavated soil on the Brampton Road side of the site in order to add to the noise-barrier. However, this may not now be possible and the far more expensive option of removing the soil from the site may have to be considered. All other questions have been answered and settled and the PC is waiting for the decision of the District Council.



It looks as though work may be about to start on the junction improvements at Buckden and Brampton Roads.

The PC has had no notice from the District Council, but some road markings have appeared. The Parish Council is keen for this improvement to take place, as it will slow down traffic turning left into Brampton Road.

The Cambridgeshire Quality Panel and the National Association of Local Councils have awarded Quality Status to Graham Parish Council. The Parish Council had decided on this course about a year ago in order to protect the village against the possibility of losing the independence of its council. Certain funding streams and other opportunities will be available only to councils with quality status.

A copy of the certificate will be placed on the village notice board and in the village hall.

The hedge in front of the new houses in Brampton Road will receive maintenance cut very soon. This needs to be done before the birds start nesting or it will have to wait until autumn.

Again, this year, Graham was unsuccessful in its bid for funds for a traffic calming system. The scoring system on which the award depends appears to be very random, but the PC will try again next year.

There have been a few complaints about the smell coming from the chicken farm. The Environment Agency is receiving such complaints and the Parish Council will back these up with letters of its own. However, in the first instance, the Environment Agency must have complaints from individuals.

Continued from page 3, Charity begins... next door? At first he came in on Christmas Day but in later years we went round. Champers in the morning, a tray with the full works at lunch, Stilton and port pm and the inevitable golden glass or eight later on. He was our Agricultural Policy Advisor and would water when we were away. We swapped candles in power cuts. He gave us rhubarb which entitled him to pinch our tomatoes. He was my best friend.

Sid was happy, content with his lot. But then gradually it began. His hearing was never that good - the asdic couldn't have helped - but it deteriorated. He had problems hearing the telly. Nobody else in the village did. His eyesight started to fail to such an extent that he could only read headlines. He even stopped reading books. The pub closed for many months only to reopen as a marvellous, but hopelessly useless for Sid, Indian restaurant. His eating dropped off. Other problems came and walking and climbing the dratted stairs became more irksome.

We tried, we all tried. Hearing aids, book magnifiers, special telly, cleaning help, cash card, downstairs bed, doctor appointments ('oh, I don't want to bother him'). All the things that could have helped him, helped him help himself and helped those that helped him were dismissed. He wasn't going to cause anyone any trouble! Just leave it be. Of that generation.

We almost got near to bullying. Perhaps we should have done. Perhaps not. The morning after that August evening, Sid was taken to hospital and he died shortly after. On reflection, he had pointedly said that evening - as he always did - that he didn't regret anything and that he would live his life over the same. Following Anzio, he knew that he had been lucky just to have that one chance. He had worked hard, perhaps played even harder. The old body seemingly had just had enough. But his last years were as happy as his first and he knew that in that he was more fortunate than many. Time to go.

My point? By no means am I a charity pro but surely it's not always money, resources, and practical help that older folks need. It's time. It's a look over the fence. A chat. Not a once a year jolly coach trip but all through the year. And that's what next-door neighbours throughout the country can do. No money. Just a little time. Often.

'Give the cat a goldfish, let's have another' was a favourite precursor to a glass. His favourite toast was 'sod 'em all bar six, you need six for pallbearers'. Hence I was slightly taken aback when they wheeled the coffin in on a trolley. But Sid would have had a right laugh about it.

The old bugger!

THE PROPOSED ALL-WEATHER SPORTS FACILITY

A meeting was held on Sunday 27th January in order to address several concerns that were not resolved following the public meeting held in July last year.

The Parish Council, in response to correspondence from some of the residents of Inhams Way, personally invited those residents to attend the meeting.

The Parish Council addressed the following issues:

- the potential for noise pollution
- possible nuisance from flood-lighting
- the possibility of misuse of the facility
- the effect on the carbon-footprint of the village
- the management of the facility

NOISE POLLUTION The plan includes fencing that is specifically designed for its purpose and is made of materials that suppress the noise from tennis balls or footballs etc which rebound against it. This type of fence is made for the tennis court environment and the contractor's website gives information on the materials used and on the construction. The plan provides for the banking of excavated soil on the Brampton Road side of the site and for replanting trees on the bank. However, it is not clear currently, whether this will be permitted.

FLOOD-LIGHTING This is perhaps the biggest issue for people living near to the proposed site, in terms of the usage and the cost.

At this stage no specific times have been set beyond which the lighting should not be used. The Council's position is that, during the summer months the lighting will be used very rarely. During the months when the days are shorter, it is more likely that the lighting will be required. However, there will be a limit on the times of usage. The lights are energy-efficient and they are designed specifically for the environment in which they will be placed. They are angled downwards onto the playing area and there is very little light leakage.

MIS-USE This facility is being proposed as a direct result of the parish plan in which the villagers called for recreational facilities for the young and also the not-so-young. It is a facility primarily for our community. Anyone who misuses it or causes offence or nuisance will not be permitted to use it again.

Graham village is a peaceful and pleasant place to live. In providing this resource we will be giving our young people a source of enjoyment and exercise.

As the project evolves and the way it is used becomes more clear, it may be possible to apply for funding which will provide sports coaching on the site.

Graham's cricket club, the village's tennis players and a potential rugby side have already shown interest in the facility and we intend to actively promote and encourage groups from within the village to make use of it.

THE CARBON FOOTPRINT The provision of a sports facility is our response to the government's call for more sports activities to be made available to our young people, to improve health and to ease the boredom of living in a very rural community with few facilities, if any.

A venue on your doorstep means that you won't have to travel into Huntingdon or St.Neots to play tennis or join in other sports or to take and pick up your children.

The construction and materials are all environmentally sound and further details can be found on the website of Anglia and Midland Sports Limited who are the project managers for the site. The web address is www.amss.co.uk/muga.html

At the meeting it was agreed that the Parish Council would post a full specification onto the village website at the earliest opportunity.

MANAGEMENT The Village Hall Management Committee have agreed to manage bookings for the site in the short term and Philip Allingham (PC Chairman) and his wife Jill have offered to provide this service in the longer term.

Acceptable charges for using the facility and lighting will have to be set and agreed.

In nearby Catworth there is a similar facility that has been in use for about a year. The experiences of the Catworth villagers have all been positive. Their facility is generally used until around 9pm. They do not lock it. There are signs giving information about booking the facility and how to obtain the key required to operate the lighting. There are no problems with anti-social behaviour or nuisance of any kind. Your Parish Council strives to mirror this achievement in Graham.
