

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Save All Saints Association **SAS**

It has been a busy time for SAS with a very enjoyable Minstrels and Mince Pies concert, carol singing around the village in December and hectic preparations for a sell-out Burns Night Supper in January.

The highlights of the Aragon Singers' Minstrels evening were the varied range of superb singing and the fascinating treat of music from an expert at



handbell playing. Mince pies were consumed in large quantities and over £250 was raised.

A few days later eighteen hardy carol singers toured just about every street in the village, sang heartily, and enjoyed the feast of Christmas lights decorating so many village houses. The kindness of villagers meant that the collection produced £142 towards church restoration work. I suppose the quality of singing may have helped too. Certainly it was heartening to see one toddler listening intently at a window, though it was also rumoured that

dow, though it was also rumoured that elsewhere we were paid not to sing because another toddler was asleep.

By now the January Burns Night Supper will have been and gone. We know it was a sell-out, with 75 people sitting

down to enjoy what, hopefully, will have been an evening as enjoyable as the 2008 Burns event.

It is now 15 months since the SAS was formed. We really appreciate all the support villagers have given the organization, especially by attending its events in such good numbers. We are pleased to report that we have now passed the £5,000 mark in our fund-raising. £2,500 of this amount has been handed to All Saints Church Parochial Church Council as a contribution to the costs of the 2008 investigation into the causes of the cracks. So whatever news the investigation report brings, we have already made as start on raising the further funds needed to remedy the problems.

Pancake Day



A Shepherd's Tale - 4

At last I think tupping may have finished. I fitted a green raddle earlier this month and so far there appears to have been no obvious activity. The wax in the raddle crayon will have been very hard with the frosts so there is a chance that one ewe may have been covered but the



mark is very faint. It's most likely that she did not move away quickly enough when the ram tried to mount her.

At the same time as changing the raddle, we injected the ewes and shearlings (last year's ewe lambs) with a vaccine that covers a cocktail of seven diseases including blackleg, pulpy kidney and Pasteurella. The consequences of these diseases are dead sheep or lambs - often the first and only symptom - so it is well worth doing. The injections have to be given annually, although the first year of treatment requires two doses 4-6 weeks apart. As the older ewes have an uncertain vaccination history we have started them all afresh and will need to jab them again in late February. The injections are quite simple to give and placed under the skin in the neck area. The immunisation also gives some protection to new born lambs.

Getting the ewes in to check them, can be hard work without a sheepdog. Hitherto they have responded very well to the rattle of a bucket with sheep nuts but unfamiliar surroundings, a poorly positioned penning area and enough grass can make them less than cooperative. My poor wife, Ruth, has to act as my "dog" and I am afraid she has neither the sheepdog's innate positional sense nor its steely stare. So it often takes two-three attempts to pen the ewes and some verbal abuse. Ruth has the knack of not quite standing in the right place or moving at the wrong time, so I have resorted to giving her the same commands as I would my old sheepdog, although she won't lie down!

It's been fun doing the daily check in the frosty weather, the ewes are often still asleep and have frost on their backs and when they stand up there is large ewe-shaped green area, where they have heated the ground. Grass is in shorter supply and of lower quality now, but there is still plenty around for basic maintenance and certainly the nutritional quality is no better than hay. At this time of year it is normal for ewes to slim down a bit, however in the 6 weeks before lambing, rations are increased with sheep nuts to help grow the lamb(s) inside the ewe and prepare the ewe to provide plenty of milk after lambing.

Thank you to everyone who came to our coffee morning in December. The committee really appreciates your support - we raised £70.

Dr Bundy has returned to work Wednesdays and Fridays. Dr Steffes, has been appointed on a permanent contract to work on Mondays and Tuesdays. Dr Sarah Henderson, a consultant dermatologist, has joined Dr Fargnoli to expand that aspect of the surgery's work.

Our Annual Patient Survey is due in January. Over a five day period, patients will be invited to fill out a questionnaire to enable the doctors assess patient satisfaction and establish where any necessary improvements could be made. Your opinions can influence the decisions, so your cooperation is invaluable. Also randomly selected patients will receive a survey form through the post in a government funded survey. The PCT has withdrawn chiropody services at Buckden.Patients will have to attend either the Oak Tree Centre in Huntingdon or the Dumbelton Medical Centre in St Neots. We are assured that they will provide a better service with more Clinicians for longer hours and will, where necessary, provide transport. However, they have also reduced services available on the NHS and some patients may, in future, have to pay for treatment. So please check when you phone for an appointment.

Patients planning holidays in exotic places are reminded to organize any necessary jabs at the same time as they book the holiday - this will ensure that the appropriate vaccines are available in time to give thr protection required.

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
