A Shepherd's Tale - 9 *Patrick Goldsworthy*

Our last ewe lambed as the *Grafham Gossip* went to press last month; and then, shortly afterwards, decided to turn up her toes leaving us with a lamb to bottle feed. Luckily the ewe survived for 36 hours before expiring so the lamb had plenty of time to get colostrum, which gives it anti-bodies and protection in the first weeks of life. Naturally, the boys were pleased to have the fun of bottle feeding, but in practice it's a real nuisance and of course it was a ram lamb so it will end up in a freezer.

Losing two ewes in a small flock is quite a hit, but I was lucky enough to spot that a flock near Ipswich was being dispersed. My fiftieth birthday treat was to buy two replacement ewes with lambs at foot; the ewes I chose were big and solid and quite similar in type to my existing Southdowns. Anyway they have settled down well.

The major event this month was shearing. Brian and his grandson Gavin came at the end of May and made quick work of the five ewes and four shearlings. We have now four bin-liners of wool. In the medieval times, wool was a major UK commodity sadly today with the popularity of man-made fibres it is more a nuisance and a waste issue. Some breeders are even selecting for easy-care/ no-shear sheep. Certainly it can cost more to shear than the wool is worth which seems a great shame. Southdown wool, although one of the finest of UK wools, has a short staple (length), therefore it often has to be blended

with other wools to make it fit for spinning. I haven't decided what I am going to do with the wool yet. However, it is excellent insulation material and I have a friend whose loft is full of wool and swears by it!

Ninth Successful Year for the Grafham Wildlife and Conservation Group

After spending 8 years as voluntary warden at Brampton Wood, Sam with his team decided to move on to other woodlands in the Grafham area.

In October 2000, the Grafham Wildlife and Conservation Group was born and has since gone from strength to strength. The group's aim is to manage the woodlands for their wildlife values using traditional woodland management skills. During the 9 years the group has been running it has become well known and respected for the skilful and professional approach in managing these woodlands.

The group also takes regular guided walks which have become very popular and also teaches woodland crafts and survival skills to local groups such as Cubs and Scouts.

In 2007, the Grafham Wildlife and Conservation Group set up a Historical Pictorial Photographic Display of local villages; this project has surpassed all expectations and the collection is growing daily.

This year the group gained a grant, some of which was used to promote the need for more volunteers; part of this was to produce a flyer which was sent out with the *Grafham Gossip*, most of the village received one and we successfully recruited new volunteers.

Last year we tried a new project which is to provide Vehicular Guided Access for disabled persons around local woodlands and places of interest such as Grafham Water. This has also become popular and the group is looking at funding to keep this project going.

This year's 'Evening Guided Walks' have started and **the next historical pictorial photographic displays will be at the Ellington Gala on the 27th of June** and at Hail Weston on the 4th and 5th of July. Grafham Cricket Club

"Cometh the hour: Cometh the man" a cliché, but a truism that is borne out by experience. Ben Dickson, became vice captain in 2008, at a time when several stalwarts of Grafham Cricket Club retired, and there was a genuine fear that the club would fold through lack of players. Ben with other members of the club sought new players, and as can be said in another cliché, "the rest is history". Grafham had its best season for several years, finishing 3rd in Division 2, and being unexpectedly promoted to Division 1 for the 2009 season.



Last Saturday (June 13th 2009) was Ben's last game for Grafham. The game was against Rushden United at Kempston Park in Bedford, where several trees sit within the boundary of the cricket pitch. Grafham scored a credible 138 all out, Duncan Palmer (41); Tom Chester (20); Chris Brown (18) being the main batting contributors, along with extras.

Rushden were cruising to victory on 81 for 3 when Ben started to bowl. The first over was sedate, with just 2 runs being scored, but it was in the next 4.5 overs that the hurricane struck; resulting in Ben getting 6wkts for 10 runs, with Adi Love chipping in with 1wkt, leaving Rushden all out for 109; 29 runs short of Grafham's total. We shall miss you Ben, but thanks for the finale.

Grafham have so far won 2 games in Division 1, beating Lidlington at home by 7wkts in the previous week to the Rushden game. So far the statistics read Played 6 Won 2 Lost 4 Points 66; perhaps Grafham are finding their feet in Division 1?

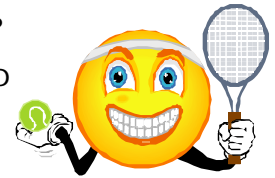

View from the Pew!

The congregation is very pleased to hear that Hazel Powell has felt the call to be our next Churchwarden. Hazel was licensed to undertake her duties by Archdeacon McCurdy on 15th June at a moving service in Buckden Church. Although Hazel is a 'seasoned churchgoer', the role of Churchwarden will be a new and varied challenge for her; we ask for God's blessings on Hazel as she undertakes this role in faith.

On 9th June the church was full as we said our 'goodbyes' to Jim Craig. We offer our sympathies and love to Marge and all her family at this sad time.

Since the last *Grafham Gossip*, the PCC has met to discuss the report from the Architect and Structural Engineer regarding the cracks in the church. As expected, subsidence is considered to be the main cause of the cracking along with the contributory factors of drainage, weakening of the rood spiral staircase and tree root incursion. It has been suggested that the PCC should now obtain specialist advice on the management of the tree roots and that masonry around the pier at the nave/chancel/north aisle junction is reinforced. Additionally, some underpinning of this pier is also recommended. Talks with the Architect are ongoing to discern the best way forward with these recommendations. Of course, all of this work will be costly so the drive to raise funds and grants is continuing apace. With this in mind we thank the SAS and all participating Grafham gardeners for organising the splendid afternoon of 'Open Gardens' on 7th June; and we thank God for allowing the sun to shine right on cue!

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

June 2009 IMPORTANT CHANGE OF CONTACT NUMBER FOR THE POLICE CONTROL ROOM:

All non emergencies in the county can now be reported by calling 0345 456 456 4

This move allows people with call packages which provide free local calls to benefit as 0345 numbers are classified as free calls.

The old 0845 number will remain operational alongside the new number as old materials are used up.

Cambridgeshire Police are following in the footsteps of other forces who have already made the change to 03 numbers.

The change does not in anyway affect 999 calls. You should continue to call 999 in the case of an emergency.

The bad news this month is that there have been two reported break-ins and thefts in the village - one during the day time and the other in the evening, resulting in goods being stolen. These are ongoing investigations with the police.

I have been asked again to mention that there is a need for us all to be vigilant and ensure property is securely locked and nothing of value is left on display in parked vehicles.

Police are trying to contact owners of two ridgeback mountain bikes which were discovered at an address in the Arbury. One bike is grey and the other silver. Both are in almost new condition and believed stolen. Police are appealing to people who own such bikes to make sure they are still where they left them as they may not yet know they are missing. Huntingdon & District Neighbourhood Policing team are dealing with the matter - contact via the control room.

New Safety Camera Vans are in use on the county's roads, replacing the yellow vans previously used to conduct speed checks by the safety camera unit. The new blue vans are larger and have camera logos on the side. Between June 15th & 22nd they were in constant use on the A14 & A141 to name two roads close to us. They are also in use on B roads in the vicinity. The Police Authority publish a Safety Camera Diary listing the roads they will be monitoring on a weekly basis, which can be found on the Cambridgeshire Police Authority website.

The Police started a drink/driving campaign on June 1st.

sAs Save All Saints Association Grafham Open Gardens

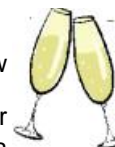
