



A Shepherd's Tale -18

The last lamb has just arrived, a small single ram lamb out of one of my smaller shearling ewes. In fact in the last few days, I had been beginning to wonder if this ewe was in-lamb as she did not look very big, but anyway she has now proved me wrong.

It has been a mixed lambing this year. After last year's disaster of losing two ewes to twin lamb disease, it is a marked in improvement, but as I look back on some of this year's

lambing there is sense of frustration: lambs died that could have been saved. Most annoying were the loss of two single lambs: one big old ewe dropped her lamb very quickly and the amniotic sack never broke so the lamb drowned in its own birth fluid and another dreadful tragedy was to find a new born lamb drowned in a water trough. I can't work out whether the lamb staggered in there or the ewe dropped her lamb in the trough (water births are not for sheep). With a small flock, a day job, unco-operative teenagers (are they ever co-operative?), it's just not realistic to supervise every birth; though next year I will investigate whether, by synchronous mating I can get the ewes to lamb closer together and so I can justify spending more time in the lambing pen.

There have been some highs: The ewe with a prolapsed vagina had a fine set of twin rams, and we got her harness off at just the right time; and we have had two sets of triplets although we lost a lamb from one set. The surviving full set were a lovely trio of ewe lambs. As we are



a small flock the timing of births of the "spare lambs" unfortunately did not work out for fostering purposes so we now have two lambs on the bottle. One was a twin who, although healthy, just could not get the knack of suckling from his mum, and one of the triplet ewe lambs - again a poor early suckler. We have

also had for the first time a lamb with tetanus, this is usually fatal and can best be prevented by inoculating the ewe before hand (which we had done), dressing the navel with iodine and ensuring the lamb got a good dose of colostrum early on. As it was one of the bottle-fed lambs I suspect it was due to a lack of colostrum. Any way the good news so far, is that although she is still walking with a stiff neck (the tetanus toxin puts the muscle into spasm and can take three or more weeks to clear from the system), she is thriving and joining in the jumps and races that the lambs do in the evening.

I am not a great fan of the BBC and farming; too often they get it wrong or work to some director or interest group's private agenda. However, if you caught "Lambing Live" (which you may still be able to access on BBC iplayer), it portrayed the highs and lows of lambing and sheep farming absolutely right, and is certainly worth watching if you can spare the time.

Letter to the Editors.

Míd-air collision, 13th June 1958

I am a retired USAF air traffic controller who was at Molesworth in mid 1950s. After the



flying moved to Alconbury I heard there was a mid-air collision between an RAF Canberra and USAF T33 near your village. The pilot of the T33 was my commander when I was at Molesworth. I was wondering if there was anyone still there who would know anything about the incident.

Thanks to Grafham's own local historian Sam Malt, we were able to e-mail Bob with a full page article from "Aviation News" February/March 1990.

The paragraph below is a small section of the article provided by Sam. The aircraft involved in the collison (on Friday, June 13th 1958,) were USAF Lockheed T-33A 56-1604 from the 20th Fighter-Bomber Wing at Wethersfield and RAF Canberra PR.7 WJ823 from No.58 Squadron at Wyton. Both were on routine training flights and the T-33 had last been in radio contact with Alconbury Tower only 30 seconds before the collision. The crews, respectively, were Captain David C. Evans, a flying instructor from Alconbury and 1st Lieutenant Edgar L. Stephenson, his pupil, from the 55th FBS, 20th FBW at Wethersfield. In the Canberra was Flying Officer Bryan Crocker, pilot and Flight Lieutenant Walter Stevens, navigator. All four airmen were killed in the collision which occurred over the village of Spaldwick.

Chocolate Easter Nests

225g (8oz) milk chocolate 50g (2oz) butter 2 tablespoons of golden syrup 100g (4oz) cornflakes Small packet of mini eggs 10 paper baking cases

- 2. Break the chocolate into pieces and place in a large saucepan.
- 3. Add the butter and golden syrup.
- 4. Heat the pan, stirring the mixture all the time until the chocolate and the butter have melted.
- 5. Turn off the heat. Add the cornflakes and stir gently until they are covered in chocolate.
- 6. Place the corn-

flake mixture into the paper baking cases and make a small hollow in the centre of each nest with the back of a teaspoon. 7.Place a few eggs in each nest and then

7. Place a few eggs in each nest and then place the tray into the fridge for about an hour to allow the nests to set.

8. The nests are best stored in an airtight container in the fridge but should be eaten within three days.

PARISH NEWS...

There was no meeting of the Parish Council this month. However, there has been a request for clarification over the recycling bins.

According to information from the District Council,

they now have equipment suitable for sorting glass from dry recycling materials. They will therefore be removing the glass recycling bins from various sites around the district, including Grafham Village Hall. However, they have stated that the income from the bins will continue to be paid during 2010/11. Grafham has historically earned approximately £800 per year for the Village Hall.

Your glass waste for recycling should be placed in your blue bin once the village hall bins have been removed. You may want to consider whether or not you will need an additional bin or green box.

Bins for the recycling of other materials, such as clothing, will replace the glass bins.

The Parish Council have heard from Patricia Jordan, District Councillor, that this has not been a popular decision. However, it is not clear how much opposition has been voiced.



The surgery car park bears testimony to the depredations of a long hard winter! When the weather is better, it will be repaired and extended. Renovation work will begin soon to create an extra consulting room and treatment room to the left and right as you enter Reception.

In response to requests, Dr Irwin, on behalf of the BSPA, is arranging a presentation about prostate cancer and related problems. As soon as we have details, they will be advertised.

Patients with chronic health problems are to be offered the opportunity to enroll in the Expert Patient Programme to be held Buckden Millennium Hall. This will be a two and a half hour session, once a week for a six weeksand it is entirely free, funded by the PCT. There is a substantial body of evidence confirming the benefits that patients experience once having completed the course, including a significant improvement in quality of life and their ability to manage their condition. Patients will be contacted by the Surgery,

but you can call for further details. This is a great local opportunity; please do take advantage of it.

Having recently read about the appalling standard of care at the Mid-Staffordshire

NHS Hospital, it might be pertinent to remind patients and relatives of an organisation through which they can channel concerns. The Patient Advice Liaison Scheme [PALS] operates an office in Addenbrookes, Hinchingbrooke and Peterborough Hospitals and is there to help to resolve problems before they develop into serious issues. The scheme is independent of the NHS and can offer anonymity if preferred. Talking to them is a much more constructive way of sorting out problems than going to the press . They diligently follow up problems on your behalf and linform you of the outcome.


